Summer 2018 Review

This summer has been a resounding success for the Education Project. Not only have we worked alongside Bridge for Change to complete another cycle of the Career Network Support, we have also developed a number of other impact-driven initiatives.

The CDI and Kite DSM teams have implemented the first full programme-cycle of KompyutHER, created an online knowledge bank for students and graduates called Career Hub, piloted interactive, creative English Clubs at a local primary school and led the creation of a large-scale research project alongside Aga Khan University into the mental health of Tanzanian youth and the support systems available to them.

We feel that these ideas address crucial gaps within the Education sector in Tanzania, and hope that further research and development will produce sustainable, impactful programmes that can be handed over to reliable handover partners. CDI and Kite's values include the inspiration of local change-makers, co-creation with local collaborators and the implementation of innovative projects. We hope that the Education Project will continue to develop in an upward trajectory in the years to come.
